1. Call to Order: Secretary Remy called the meeting to order at 6:06pm.

2. Public Comment:

Rob Larrea, on behalf of the Traverse Area Pickleball Association, asked the board to delay making a decision about the tennis courts at the Boardman Valley Nature Preserve so that TAPA could gather money to make them into pickleball courts.

5. Correspondence

a. Public Act 159 of 2020 (Commons 100)

Hannon said that the State Legislature has passed this Public Act to allow the existing deed restriction to be removed on the Commons 100 property and broaden the uses allowed there. Although this has gone through the State Legislature, Hannon said the actual deed transfer will still need to be executed administratively.

5. Reports

a. Commissioner Reports

Remy said he enjoyed walking at the Silver Lake Recreation area but thought that more trail signage was needed.

b. Staff Report/Updates

Parks Steward Derek Morton reported that there are signage upgrades planned for the Silver Lake Recreation Area. He reported on projects and maintenance at all parks. A fall planting will occur with trees donated through a DTE program at Silver Lake. Downed trees were removed from the Commons area and a phased development has been fleshed out for the River East property. Morton met with contractors at the Boardman Valley Nature Preserve about the tennis court demolition and he is gathering snow removal bids.

c. Grand Traverse Conservation District Report

Tom Vitale reported that they have been working on Silver Lake signage and looking at small projects for fall completion.

a. PD 2020-135 – BVNP Tennis Court Transformation 2020 Project
Parks Steward Derek Morton gathered estimates for the crack seal and
asphalt layer to turn the tennis courts into much needed additional parking
at Boardman Valley Nature Preserve. The additional parking would make
about 30 new parking spaces. Board members discussed the proposed
parking area considering the public comment. Board members
expressed concerns with the water table and adding more parking
demand to the park. Rob Larrea spoke once again on behalf of TAPA.

Bukowski moved and Schmuckal seconded to recommend to the township board to accept the bid from Molon for a project at Boardman Valley Nature Preserve to replace the existing old tennis courts with an additional parking lot area.

\$166,000 to be recommended to the Township Board.

BACKGROUND AND UPDATE:

At the May 4, 2020 Parks and Recreation Commission meeting, Staff provided information on the issues pertaining to the Commons 100 deed restriction. This restriction does not allow bicycling on the parcel and needs to be removed before any trail design planning can occur.

The first step in removing the deed restriction was legislative action to authorize the transfer of the deed of the Commons 100 from Garfield Township to the State of Michigan and asking the State to reissue it to the Township with the deed restriction language removed. Senator Wayne Schmidt introduced Senate Bill 595 on October 22, 2019. Thanks to his ongoing leadership, SB 595 passed out of the Senate unanimously on February 18, 2020.

The bill was then referred to the House, which passed their bill on September 9, 2020 with substitute (H-1) acknowledging a slight change in wording. The Senate passed the bill including the House substitute on September 10, 2020. Governor Whitmer signed the bill into law as Public Act 159 of 2020 on September 17, 2020. Staff would like to acknowledge local trail advocate and former legislative aide, Gabe Schneider, for his role this year in keeping momentum moving forward on this legislation.

Although Public Act 159 of 2020 has been signed into law, this only authorizes the transfer of the deed to occur. Execution of this deed transfer needs to be finalized administratively with the State Department of Technology, Management, and Budget. Staff is working with State officials on this matter.

PLANNING CONTEXT:

Removing this deed restriction is only a preliminary step to conduct a community-based planning process. Because the Commons Natural Area is a place treasured by residents from around the region, this planning process will need to engage the broader community.

While there has never been a formally adopted plan for design of the Commons Natural Area, there have been some discussions with community groups over the past few years and some planning documents have acknowledged the site as a multi-use recreational asset, including the following:

- 2010 Grand Traverse Commons Master Plan
- 2014 Forest Management Plan for Garfield Township Commons Property
- 2016 Trails Focus Group
- 2017 Grand Traverse Commons Development Regulations
- 2018 Garfield Township Master Plan
- 2018-2023 Garfield Township Parks and Recreation Master Plan

The Commons Natural Area site also has several easements over it including conservation easements and historic preservation easements, which may limit what improvements can be done. Also, so far this year there have been several large rainstorms which have contributed to erosion issues on the site. The planning process for the Commons Natural Area will need to account for these existing conditions.

The planning process also needs to account for different user groups. Hiking, biking, skiing (cross-country and backcountry), snowshoeing, and dog walking are common uses on the Commons site. Mountain biking is a historically established use at the Commons, as bicyclists have been using trails there since at least the 1980s. There is a relatively extensive and well-established informal network of mountain bike trails within the Commons. However, some of these trails, including some newer "rogue" trails, have exacerbated the erosion issue on the site, and there is concern among users regarding potential pedestrian-bicycle conflicts.

PROPOSED PLANNING PROCESS:

With the background information in mind, Staff proposes to work on the following tasks over the next few months to help advance the planning process for the Commons Natural Area:

Convene Partnership of Key Property Owners

Staff recommends beginning the process by engaging key property owners and forming a partnership for this project. The Township owns most of the property on which the park is located, but other entities own additional parcels in and adjacent to the park. Other key property owners include the following:

- Traverse City / Garfield Township Recreational Authority
- Sub Area 3 LLC / The Minervini Group LLC
- Copper Ridge Professional Center / Retail Marketplace
- Munson Medical Center

Existing Conditions Report

Staff intends to gather information on current conditions at the Commons as part of an Existing Conditions Report which would be included in the final plan document. Staff would review prior planning efforts and documents described in the Planning Context above, as well as other information relevant to the Commons site. For example, there are conservation and historical easements on the site which may limit what can be done on certain portions of the site. There have also been ongoing erosion issues which were exacerbated by the heavy rains earlier this year, and this report may help identify key environmentally sensitive areas.

Establish Advisory Group

Staff recommends forming an advisory group to help guide the planning process and provide key feedback to Staff and consultant team members. The advisory group will include representatives of the different user groups and stakeholders to provide different viewpoints. This group will also include representatives from boards and commissions with a stake in the Commons. Potential advisory group membership includes the following areas:

- Garfield Township Parks and Recreation Commission
- Grand Traverse Commons Joint Planning Commission
- Traverse City / Garfield Township Recreational Authority
- Grand Traverse Regional Land Conservancy
- Grand Traverse Conservation District
- User groups (hikers, mountain bikers, cross-country skiers, etc.)
- Neighbors / nearby residents

The advisory group will help guide the planning process including identifying goals, identifying resources to conduct the process, designating milestones and timelines, assisting with public engagement, and other key tasks. One immediate task will be to help guide the creation and publication of a Request for Proposals (RFP) for park design services.

Issue RFP for Park Design Services

Staff intends to use feedback from the advisory group to issue an RFP for park design services. This RFP would seek out a park design professional firm to guide the design of the Commons. The firm would use input from the advisory group and from public engagement efforts to create conceptual park designs. This would likely take the form of different scenarios for which the public could provide input. The firm would also then help to determine the preferred scenario with potential projects and an implementation schedule. Staff and the Parks and Recreation Commission would use any potential project information from the final plan to inform the Parks Capital Improvements Program (CIP) for 2021 and beyond.

ACTION REQUESTED:

Staff is seeking feedback from the Parks and Recreation Commission on the proposed planning process and the immediate next steps. If the Parks and Recreation Commission feels comfortable with the process as presented here, then Commissioners may also consider nominating a representative to serve on the advisory group for the project.

Park Description

The 84-acre Silver Lake Recreation Area ("Silver Lake Park") is located at 1785 N. East Silver Lake Road. Amenities at the park include restrooms, grills, a tee-ball field, tennis courts, basketball courts, dog park, a sledding hill, and a multi-use field for playing catch, football, or tossing a Frisbee. Paved and unpaved walking trails are also offered. The paved trail loop surrounds the developed portion of the site and measures 3,700 feet long (seven-tenths of a mile). The unpaved trails, which meander around Hidden Lake and near the shores of the north branch of Silver Lake, total about 4,400 feet in length.

There are three picnic pavilions at this park, which may be reserved and are popular for family reunions and company picnics. Pavilion reservations are available on a first-come, first-served basis for a nominal fee. Before submitting your Park Reservation Application, we recommend that you call us at 231-941-1620 to verify that the facility you would like to reserve is available.

The Dog Park at Silver Lake Recreation Area is a huge success. There is even a Facebook Page to find out when your furry friend will be there to play. When using the dog park, please be sure to familiarize yourself with the park rules and help others to understand them as well.
